OPENING FROM THE PRESIDENT



The Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture will once again conduct a statewide poster contest at the agricultural fairs. Participating fairs will hold their own contest and submit one poster from each age group to the state level for additional judging and cash prizes. Entries must be received by or postmarked on November 1, 2023.

This year's theme is "Rooted in Progress". Contestants are asked to submit artwork that reflects the deep roots of agriculture in Pennsylvania's history and the significant innovations farmers and their families have made and continue to make, to grow and adapt as markets, consumers, and resources change.

- 1. Only one poster may be submitted per exhibitor, per age group. There will be three state competitions: ages 8-11, 12-14, and 15-18. Exhibitors must be in one of these age groups as of June 1 of the current fair season to qualify.
- 2. The poster size must be either 14 x 22 inches or 14 ½ x 22 inches. Other sizes will not be accepted for judging at the state level.
- 3. Exhibitors using other themes will be disqualified at the state level.
- 4. The fair secretary or contest coordinator is responsible for submitting the poster and completing the entry form for each poster with each age group to the Fair Office. Please be sure to provide all the information requested on the entry form; incomplete forms will be returned.
- Posters must be packaged flat. Posters rolled or folded will be ineligible for judging. Please, do not mail the posters to the PA Farm Show Complex.
- 6. Posters must be received by, or post marked on November 1, 2023.
- Posters will be evaluated on use of the theme, visual appearance and creativity in relation to the exhibitor's age.
- 8. Premium checks for:

1st place • \$100 2nd place • \$75 3rd place • \$50

The poster contest entry form can be obtained online on the Department's website.

The fair secretary or contest coordinator is responsible for submitting the poster and completing the entry form for each poster with each age group to the Fair Office. Please be sure to provide all the information requested on the entry form; incomplete forms will be returned. The poster and entry form can be given to the Fair Administrator at the PSACF fall zone meetings or mailed to the Fair Fund Office:



These checks will be presented by the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture to the top three individuals. Winners will be notified in advance and invited to attend an awards presentation. Participants are required to provide their social security numbers for award disbursements from the PA Department of Agriculture.

All posters will become the property of the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture for possible future promotional activities for the Pennsylvania Farm Show and Pennsylvania State Association of County Fairs. Any duplication of posters from previous years will be disqualified. Posters will not be returned via mail. Contestants may arrange to have their entries returned following the PA Farm Show through their individual fairs; however, the posters must be picked up in person at the PSACF Convention or Spring Zone Meetings.



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SOMERSET COUNTY FAIR QUEEN CONTEST

Fair Queen \$1,000 • 1st Runner-up: \$300 • 2nd Runner-up: \$250 • \$50 each for promenade, speech, and fair knowledge

Over the years, Swank's Steel City Shows, The Somerset County Fair Queen Contest is one of the highlights of the fair. Contestants have an informal meeting with the judges prior to the contest. Then the contestants in gowns are interviewed during an on-stage segment of the contest. The newly elected queen is presented with a crown, sash, sash pin, and a bouquet of flowers for her to have as a lasting memory of her reign.

Over the years, Swank's Steel City Shows, Somerset Trust Co., the Wheeler Family, Animal Medical Center of Somerset County Inc., Clapper's Building Materials, Fullerton Promotions, and the Somerset County Commissioner John P. Vatavuk have sponsored awards.

We would like to thank them for their generous donations to help these young ladies further their education.

Local judging consists of the following:

- Poise, Appearance, Neatness, Speaking Ability, and Knowledge of the fair industry.
- 2. An essay (300 words or less) on "What My Fair Means to Me."
- 3. A 3-to-5 minute speech on "Why You Should Come to My Fair."

Since the Pennsylvania State Fair Queen Contest began in 1987, the Somerset County Fair has had five state queens. Many others have placed in the top five. Jill Romesberg was the first state queen. Wendy Will won the contest in 1991, Jennifer Randall in 1995, Julie Sechler in 1999, and Cassie Hay in 2003, Abby Knapp 2020 Alt State Fair Queen. The state contest is held each year in January. All contestants for the PA State Fair Queen must apply through their local fair and follow the rules set for by the State Fair Queen Committee. The Somerset County Fair Association pays expenses for the queen and her parents while attending the state competition.



PFACE

Pa. State Association of County Fairs STATE COMPETITION FAIR QUEEN RULES AT THE STATE COMPETITION:

- The girls will be judged on: Poise, Appearance -Two casual outfits -Neatness, Ability to Communicate (speaking ability), and Knowledge of the fair industry.
- A written essay will be required to be submitted on: "What My Fair Means To Me" (300 words or less).
- 3. Must present at the state competition a 3 to 5 minute speech on "Why You Should Come To My Fair."
- 4. Will compete in the slate competition which will be held in January.
- 5. All contestants will receive an individual gift and the winner and the alternate will each receive cash awards. the honor of reigning as the Pennsylvania Fair Queen will be for a period of one year. The cash awards will be in the form of higher education scholarships and will be presented upon verification of enrollment from the higher education institution.
- 6. All contestants must apply through their local fair. It is a requirement that local fairs follow the rules set forth by the State Queen Committee in order to have a con1eslant in the slate competition. It is the responsibility of the fair or the individual contestant to pay for the expense involved in attending the slate competition in January.

State Queen Contest entry forms will be available from the secretarytreasurer of the PSACF by mid-August All entries are due by September

Contestants must meet these requirements:

- ▶ Never married young ladies between the ages of 16 as of June 1, and 20 inclusive.
- ▶ Residents of Somerset County.
- ▶ Have farm, 4-H, FFA or FHA background.
- Must be available to reside over activities during Fair Week.

Below are the Official PA Fair Queen Program rules. Each Fair Queen contestant must

- 1. Be a female who is a U.S. citizen and a resident of Pennsylvania.
- Be at least age 16, but no older than 20, years of age as of June 1 of the year entering the local contest
- 3. Be certified as the winner by the local fair where she was crowned.
- 4. Have not been a former local Fair Queen winner, nor a former State Fair Queen contestant
- Not hold any other title for any other commodity group or pageant during her reign.
- 6. Have her parent(s)' or guardian(s)' consent to enter the competition.
- 7. Be single, have never been married, have not been pregnant nor given birth to a child.
- 8. Act in accordance with the PA Fair

- Queen "Behavior Policy" see below
- Meet all time commitments, Queen obligations and Dress Code as set forth by the PA Fair Queen Program.

FAIR QUEEN BEHAVIOR POLICY:

The Contest's governing Board shall have the sole discretion to determine whether, in its judgment, the Queen, Alternate or Contestants may continue to participate in the Program, in the event that Board determines that any statement or representation is not true and accurate, or that any action is inconsistent with the rules, standards and dignity of the Program.

The following will be considered violations of the Policy and will be grounds for immediate disqualification dismissal and/or being banned from future Queen competitions:

- Any infractions of any Queen Contest rules.
- Smoking, drinking alcoholic beverages, chewing gum, foul language and/or public displays of affection to dates/boyfriends while wearing crown and/or sash and representing the Queen Program.
- Engagement in any illegal, unpartisan, unethical, indecent and/or morally questionable behavior, including but not limited to online representations on the Internet such as social networking sites (Facebook and MySpace).
- Use of any illegal controlled dangerous substances or abusing the use of alcohol or other dangerous substances.

- Any defamation of the Queen Contest, its winners and contestants, and the Fair or the PA Fair Queen Program and their Directors and Committee members, whether it be oral or written. This includes postings on the Internet
- Any uncooperative or unsportsmanlike conduct before, during or after the competition.
- Any unsolicited or unauthorized appearances or representations of the Queen Program in crown and banner.

FAIR QUEEN DRESS CODE: Wearing of the Fair Queen crown and/or sash is to be considered

and/or sash is to be considered an honor and privilege. The bearer represents herself, her

family, her community and Fair. Therefore professional appearance is expected while in crown and sash:

- 1. Attire that is conducive to the specific appearance or event (i.e. business casual, formal, etc.)
- 2. No jeans, sneakers, flip flops or boots.
- 3. No visible piercings (other than earrings) or tattoos.
- 4. No outfit that is too low cut, too short or too revealing.
- No clothing that advertises, promotes, or glorifies the use of alcohol, tobacco, drugs, or anything inconsistent with the dignity of the Queen Program.

Rules of the Tournament

Scoring Rules: Rule 1. Sec. a. A shoe must be within 6 inches of the stake to score.

Sec. b. Closest shoe to the stake scores 1 point

See. c. Two shoes closer than opponents 2 points

Sec. d. One (1) ringer scores 3 points

Sec. e. Two (2) ringers score 6 points

Sec. f. One ringer and closest shoe of the same player scores 4 points

Sec. g. Party having two ringers against one for the opponent scores 3 points

Sec. h. All equals count as ties and no points are scored (For instance, one ringer each thrown by both players, but player is credited with the ringer thrown on the score sheet by Symbol "O.")

Sec. i. In case each contestant has a ringer, the next closest shoe, if within 6 inches shall score 1 point

Sec. j. In case of tie, such as four (4) ringers, or contestant's shoes are equal distance from the stake causing no score for either, party pitching last in the inning will start the next inning.

Sec. k. A leaning shoe has no value over one touching the stake.

Rule 2 Sec. a. The points shall be scored according to the position of the shoes at the innings' end, that is, after the contestants have each thrown two shoes. (A game is divided into innings and each inning constitutes the pitching of two shoes by each contestant.)

Rule 3. Sec a. No contestant, while opponent is in pitching position, shall make any remark or utter any sounds within the hearing of the opponent nor make any movement that does or might interfere with the opponent's playing. Penalty- both shoes of the offender shall be declared foul in the inning complained of.

Rule 4. Sec a. No contestant shall touch own or opponent's shoe or shoes until winner of the point or points has been agreed upon by contestants or decision is rendered by the referee. Referee shall declare "foul" shoes thrown by a contestant failing to comply with this rule and award points

to the opponent according to the position of his shoes.

Sec. b. No contestant shall walk to the opposite stake or be informed of the position of shoes prior to the completion of an inning.

Sec. c. A player when not pitching must remain on the opposite side of the stake to the player in action and to the rear of a line even with the stakes.

Rule 5. Shoe is "delivered" when it leaves the hand.

Rule 6. Choice of Pitch. Choice of first pitch or follow shall be determined by the toss of a coin. In successive games between the same players, the lower shall have the choice.

Rule 7. Broken Shoes. When a shoe lands in fair territory and is broken into separate parts, it shall be removed and the contestant allowed to pitch another shoe in its stead.

Rule 8. Sec. a. Foul Shoes. A shoe pitched while the contestant stands beyond the box foul limits. A shoe striking outside the opposite pitching box or on the hard surface area when the courts are so constructed.

Sec. b. Foul shoes shall be removed from the opposite pitcher's box at the request of the opponent

Sec. c. A foul shoe shall not be scored or credited except in the score sheet column headed, "shoes pitched."

Rule 9. Measurements. Measurements to determine points won shall be made with calipers and straight edge.

All other questions in conducting the contest not covered in the rules outlined above shall be decided according to the last published rules of the National Horseshoe Pitching Association.

Jurisdiction of Officials:

- The referee, appointed by the tournament committee, shall decide points when contestants are in doubt. He shall also see that rules are complied with.
- 2. An appeal may be made to the tournament committee if a ruling of the referee is not

considered proper. Decision of the committee shall be final. (Three members of the committee are sufficient to pass on any disputed point.)

- All protests shall be made immediately as the occasion arises. Protests covering shoes to be used or conditions of play can only be made before the start of the game.
- No protest will.affect the standing of a player after the final placing has been announced by the officials.
- If rain or other elements interfere, players must stop play and not resume until officials authorize. On resuming play, scores at the time of interference will be in effect; also, the same courts will be used by the contestants unless they agree otherwise.
- The decisions of the tournament committee regarding technical points not otherwise covered by these rules shall be final.

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

- 1. Open to any individual amateur baker who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person.
- Entrants may NOT have won 1st place in this Angel Food Cake contest at any other fair in 2023.
- Entire entry must be made from scratch. No prepackaged ingredients may be used (ex: pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.) All ingredients and decorations must be edible.
- Pennsylvania produced & packed eggs are requested to be used, if possible. Please look for the PEQAP or PA packaging dates on the carton.
- 5. The entire cake entry must be submitted for judging on cardboard or other food safe disposable setting. (All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.)
- Recipe(s) listing the ingredients and the preparation instructions must be submitted with the entry (printed on one-side of 8-1/2" x 11" size paper). Entrant's name, address and phone number must be printed on the back of all the pages. (All recipes and cakes will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.)
- 7. Refrigeration is NOT available at the Fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned, or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.
- 8. Judging will be based on the following criteria:
 - ► Flavor (smell, taste, flavoring) 30 points
 - ► Inside Characteristics (texture & lightness) **25 points**
- Overall Appearance (surface, size, color) 20 points
- ▶ Creativity 15 points
- ▶ Topping, Icing or **Decoration 10 points**

BLUE RIBBON APPLE PIE CONTEST

- Open to any individual amateur baker who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person.
- Entrants may NOT have won 1st place in this Blue Ribbon Apple Pie contest at any other fair in 2023.
- Entire entry must be made from scratch. No pre-packaged ingredients may be used (ex: pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.) All ingredients and decorations must be edible.
- Recipe must include at least 60% apples in the filling. It does not need to be a "traditional" two crusted apple pie and it can have a variety of fillings.
- 5. The entire pie must be submitted for judging in a food safe disposable pie pan. (All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.)
- The recipe for the pie and pie crust must be submitted with the entry. It should be submitted on one side of 8 1/2" by 11" paper. The recipe must list all the ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. Entrant's name, address and phone number must be printed on the back side of all the pages. (All recipes and pies will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.)
- 7. Refrigeration is not available at the Fair or PA Farm

First Place Winner is eligible for the 2024 PA Farm Show competition.

Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.

- 8. Judging will be based on the following criteria:
 - ▶ Flavor 30 points
 - Filling (consistency, doneness, moistness & flavor) 25 points
 - Crust (Color, flavor, texture, doneness) 20 points
- Overall Appearance 15 points
- Creativity 10 points

Creativity is essential to a varied competition. Do not limit your contest to a "traditional" two-crusted apple pie. We are looking for a variety of fillings in the pies; the pie must include at least 60% apples in the filling. The recipe for the pie and pie crust will also need to be submitted when entering at the Pennsylvania Farm Show. Each Fair must submit the Contest Summary Report verifying the winning apple pie baker. This person will then be eligible to enter the state competition at the 2024 PA Farm Show and will receive the Official Certification Form from the PA Fairs Special Baking Contest Committee.

NOTE: If an individual has already won 1st place at another fair in 2023 for this Blue Ribbon Apple Pie contest, that individual is now considered qualified through that Fair to compete at the 2024 PA Farm Show and is no longer eligible to enter this contest at any upcoming Fairs.

- 2. Entrants may NOT have won 1st place in this Homemade Chocolate Cake contest at any other fair in 2023.
- 3. Entire entry must be made from scratch. No pre-packaged ingredients may be used (ex: pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.) All ingredients and decorations must be edible.
- Cake recipe must feature chocolate or cocoa as a main ingredient.
- 5. Entry must be a layered chocolate cake.

First Place Winner is eligible for the 2024 PA Farm Show competition.

- 1. Open to any individual amateur baker (ages 8 through 18 at the time of the fair's contest) who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person.
- 2. Entrants may NOT have won 1st place in this PA Préferred® Junior Baking contest at any other fair in 2023.
- 3. Entry must be six (6) individual sized portions of the baked entry item (cookies, brownies or bars).
- 4. Entire entry must be made from scratch. No pre-packaged ingredients may be used (ex: pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.). All ingredients and decorations must be edible.
- 5. At least two (2) PA Preferred® or locally purchased ingredients must be used in the recipe. Some examples of qualifying ingredients include grains (such

- as oats or flour), butter, milk, eggs, fruits and/or vegetables.
- 6. A PA Preferred® logo is not required because not all PA Preferred® products carry the label. The name of the ingredient and the source is sufficient (see attached example). Contact RA-AGPAPreferred@pa.gov for any assistance with qualifying ingredients.
- 7. Entry must be submitted for judging on a food safe disposable setting. (All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.)
- 8. Recipe(s) must be submitted with the entry, printed on one side of 8-1/2" x 11" paper. Recipe must list all ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. The name of each PA Preferred® ingredient or locally purchased ingredient must be clearly listed clearly along with the source that made/ grew the product (ex: PA Preferred Milk – Galliker's brand or
- Apples Smith Farm Orchard). Entrant's name, age, address and phone number must be printed on the back side of all the pages. (All recipes and cookies-brownies-bars will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.)
- Refrigeration is not available at the fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.
- 10. Judging will be based on the following criteria:
 - ► Flavor (aroma, taste, good balance of flavorings) 30 points
 - **Texture** (appropriate for the type of cookie, brownie or bar) 25 points
 - ▶ Creativity 10 points
- Inside Characteristics (even grain, evenly baked; free from air pockets) 20 points
- Outside Characteristics (uniform size, shape, appearance; overall appeal) 15 points

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Blue Ribbon

All health papers and livestock will be checked at gate, before entering fairgrounds.

Must be accompanied by a responsible person. All health papers will be collected (copies acceptable) and held by fair board.

No livestock will be permitted on fairgrounds without health papers!

On-farm biosecurity recommendations

- Keep new animals isolated from other animals already on the promises for at least 14 days, and care for these isolated animals last, then shower, change clothes, and clean and disinfect boots before moving to other areas of the farm. Check these isolated animals daily for any signs of illness.
- Treat any animals that have been to a fair or show as if they were new animals. Keep them isolated from the other animals for at least 14 days, care for them last, then shower, change clothes. and clean and disinfect boots before moving to other areas of the farm. Check them daily for any signs of illness.
- If you have taken horses along to the fair, when you return home, keep them isolated from livestock on the farm for 14 days. Although horses are not susceptible to FMD and many other livestock diseases, they can act as carriers of the diseases and should be kept away from livestock for 14 days for this reason.
- Do not allow visitors who have traveled from a Foot-and-Mouth-Diseaseinfected country to enter your property. If they must, have them shower upon arrival, and provide clean clothing and shoes for them. Any items that accompanied them should be cleaned and then disinfected with a cloth dipped in a mild bleach solution (2.5 oz. bleach per gallon of water).
- ▶ Pets that have traveled from a foreign country should be bathed and rinsed in a vinegar solution (50 percent vinegar in water).
- ▶ Do not allow pets to roam freely on your property: They may become carriers of the FMD virus or other diseases and spread disease to susceptible animals.
- Limit the traffic onto your property, both human and vehicular.
- Any supplies or equipment that was taken to the fair should be cleaned and disinfected again before it is taken back to the farm.
- ▶ If supplies or pieces of equipment are shared between farms, they should be cleaned and disinfected between farms.
- ▶ Observe your livestock daily for any unusual behavior, especially lameness, decreased appetite, increased salivation, and blisters. Report any suspicious animals immediately to the USDA or PDA, or to your veterinarian. The PA Department of Agriculture has an after-hours answering machine that will alert the veterinarian on call to

return an emergency call. PDA (717-783-2200). USDA (717-782-3442).

Biosecurity checklist for livestock exhibitors

- ▶ No visitors from a country that has animals infected with foot-andmouth disease have visited my farm within the previous 30 days.
- Veterinary health inspections and health certificates are current for all of the animals I will be taking to the fair.
- All equipment, such as buckets, pitchforks, shovels, rakes, wheelbarrows, manure baskets, lead ropes, halters, nose rings, snares, clippers, scissors, brushes, etc., have been cleaned and disinfected before entering the fairgrounds. (A solution of household bleach in water is recommended for disinfection purposes: add 2 gallons of bleach to 3 gallons of water for disinfecting equipment).
- Any pets that were brought to the fair will not be allowed to run loose, but will be restrained on a leash at all times, and will be washed with a pet shampoo and rinsed with 50 percent vinegar before being allowed outside on farm property after returning home.
- ▶ I have received a list of the recommended biosecurity precautions that I should follow after returning to the farm with the animals that were taken to the fair.
- Any livestock showing signs of illness, including signs that suggest infection with foot-and-mouth disease, will be reported immediately to the livestock superintendent of the fair.
- ▶ Any questions about disease and biosecurity measures can be directed to the regional veterinarian or animal health inspector, who will be visiting the fairgrounds for daily inspections.

Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture regional veterinarians will be visiting each fair in Pennsylvania this season on a daily basis. The will be available to answer questions from exhibitors and will be doing general inspections of the animals and animal facilities.

Premium List

Instructions for making entries at the annual Somerset County Fair

* All premiums subject to continuation of state funding.

Any person wishing to make an entry, should fill out the entry blank which is provided with this premium sheet or make out a sheet giving the information called for on this blank regardless of whether the article or articles are delivered personally to the fair or sent to the secretary. To have this information in legible form readily available will eliminate much needless waiting and facilitate the work of the secretaries.

Entry day is the first Saturday, 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. There is a \$4 entry fee for all livestock and \$1 entry fee for Rabbits & Poultry

All livestock entry forms must be in the secretary's office on or before July 15th. Any livestock entry form not received on or before this date may be refused by the Somerset County Fair livestock committee. This show is open to all residents of Somerset County and others in Pennsylvania at the discretion of the livestock committee.

Entries may be sent to the Secretary of the Somerset County Fair Inc., P.O. Box 55, Meyersdale, Pa. 15552, accompanied by an entry form properly filled out. Any costs entailed in the delivery of such articles are to be borne by the exhibitor.

The Fair will use all care to ensure the safety of animals or articles sent for exhibition after arrival but will not be responsible for any damage or loss that may occur.

EXHIBITORS ARE RESPECTFULLY REQUESTED TO FORWARD TO THE SECRETARY, MEYERSDALE, PA., AT LEAST ONE WEEK BEFORE THE OPENING DAY, A LIST OF THEIR ENTRIES, GIVING THE DEPARTMENT, CLASS NUMBER AND NAME OF EACH ANIMAL OR ARTICLE FOR EXHIBITION.

While it is the desire of the Fair to pay all premiums in full as promptly as possible after the fair, yet should any contingency arise such as unfavorable weather whereby the receipts of the Fair are insufficient to do so, then the right is reserved to prorate in all exhibition classes after deducting expenses the money for premiums and the amount so paid will discharge the obligations of the Fair for the current year.

Any exhibitor, parent, sibling and/or quardian of an exhibitor and/or any other similarly situated person who removes any show animal prior to 7 p.m. on the last Saturday of the County Fair without prior written approval from the barn superintendent for the type of animal so removed will cause the exhibitor who owns and/or shows said animal to forfeit any and all premiums awarded for all animals shown by the exhibitor at that year's County Fair and said exhibitor shall also be suspended from participation at the next year's County Fair.

Exhibit hall entries to be picked up

the last Saturday between 7 and 9 p.m. and Sunday 9 a.m. to Noon.

Exhibit pick up passes will be good only on the last Saturday after 7 p.m.

See General Recommendations for Livestock release.

GENERAL RULES

County entries will be entered first. Out-of-county entries will be taken on standby basis.

The Fair will not be responsible for any articles not removed between 7:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. Saturday, the closing day of the fair.

No articles will be accepted and judged for premiums unless listed in a category in the premium book.

All premium checks must be cashed within 90 days.

- 1. All exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of the Somerset County Fair.
- 2. The fair management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as its judgment may determine.
- 3. Reasonable care will be taken to protect all exhibits on display from all injury and damage, but the fair is not, in any way, to be held responsible for accidents, loss or damage by water, fire, theft, or other wise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss.
- Entries will be made according to classification.
- 5. Premiums, as listed, may be given for meritorious exhibits. In cases where there is no competition, judges may give an award such as they deem the exhibit is worthy to receive. Same rule applies where there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered. The judges may, at their discretion, award a prize or prizes of such grade as the exhibit deserves. The fair reserves the right to determine how many entries they will accept from an exhibitor in the same class, or in the case of livestock, the same breed.
- The decision of the judges shall be final in all cases except where mistakes, fraud, misrepresentation, or collusion, not discovered at the time of award, is proven. In such cases, the superintendent, manager, or secretary of the fair or show, or such referee as he may appoint, may make the decision with his approval. The case may be appealed to the Fair Management or Show Commission from whose decision there can be no appeal.
- It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor to make known the proper name of the article or breed of livestock he is entering. Any item entered improperly, will be disqualified to receive a prize, but the judges will mark the correct name on the entry tag for the benefit of the owner so the same mistake in entering need not be made the second time.
- 8. All entries must be grown, produced or made in the county since the last

- fair (except where the fair accepts exhibits from other counties or states.)
- Superintendents of a department reserve the right of refusing to accept any entry. Furthermore, the superintendents reserve the right to bar from competition animals, vegetables, flowers, poultry, products, and manufactured articles of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition.
- 10. The Fair Management may, at any time, order the removal of any exhibit or part of exhibit in bad condition and any article unfit to show may be excluded. Food products cannot be polluted with any substance or chemical that causes them to become poisonous and unfit to be used as food. The fair should notify the Pennsylvania Fair fund in such cases and may void any premiums that might have been awarded. No exhibit may be removed at any time before the close of the fair except by consent of the management.
- 11. Every exhibit accepted for premiums must be given an entry tag which must be plainly marked, showing the name of the exhibit. In the case of livestock, the breed name must be shown on cards large enough that the breed name is readily identified by the viewers or, if the livestock is grouped together, according to breeds, one large sign to designate the group will be satisfactory. However, the award winners must be placed on the stall of the pen of the individual winners for the duration of the fair or show and, in the case of poultry entry tags showing species must be plainly exhibited on each coop and winning stickers must appear on such entry tags showing winners.
 - Failure to comply with this regulation will result in forfeiture of premiums. It will be the duty of the fair or show officials to see that this regulation is complied with. Where award ribbons are stolen or destroyed, the exhibitor may receive a duplicate at the close of fair or show which shall be supplied by the fair, free of charge.
- 12. During the judging, buildings, except livestock arenas, are to be closed to everyone except fair officials, judges, and necessary attendants. No exhibitor or his agent shall communicate with the judge during time of determining the awards except to answer questions proposed by the judges. Any exhibitor or persons interfering with the judges while making awards shall forfeit any premiums to which he would otherwise be entitled.
- 13. All livestock offered for premiums must be the property of the owners thirty (30) days or longer.
- 14. No person shall be allowed in the ring while stock is being judged except judges, superintendents, and necessary attendants.
- 15. Should any animal awarded a prize be disqualified, the animals gaining the lower prizes shall move into the next higher position, if, in the opinion of the judges, the animals are worthy

- of such prizes. Disqualification will include immediate removal of animal from fairgrounds and forfeiture of all premiums and awards.
- 16. Overfitting of cattle, sheep, hogs and goats, will be discriminated against. Any artificial means used to change the form or shape of an animal will disqualify it from competition. No mechanical or injectable alterations made to animals. No muzzles on lambs or goats.
- 17. When on exhibition in the ring, each animal must be under halter and in charge of owner or employee.
- 18. Joint ownership considered to be as one owner in accordance with regulation papers.
- Livestock may be judged on the Danish System for ribbon awards only, but not for reimbursable premiums.
- 20. See new scrapie rules for sheep and goats.
- Any exhibitor or other individual who alters pen assignments or removes panels or gates without barn superintendents approval is subject to disciplinary action at the fairboards discretion.

NON-COUNTY RESIDENTS

- ** In keeping with the policies of other county fairs, all Exhibits will be limited to Somerset County residents only.

The date of examination must also appear on the health certificate which is acceptable (legal) March 1 or later.

Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture (Department) hereby establishes a General Quarantine Order related to poultry and poultry products, including eggs, at exhibitions within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania which receive funding pursuant to the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act, 3 P.S. §1501 et seq

The Department hereby enters a General Quarantine Order, incorporating the foregoing recitals as if fully set forth hereunder and establishing a temporary prohibition against the display, exhibit or presence of poultry, poultry products, including eggs, poultry parts or any goods or items containing or made up of poultry products. such as feathers, or poultry parts at any exhibitions or other such venues within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania which receive funding pursuant to the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act, 3 P.S. § 1501 et seq..

* Flock owners must endorse official certification that all poultry and birds for exhibit originate from flocks free of evidence of contagious diseases.

** Pennsylvania chickens must be from home flocks vaccinated for laryngotracheitis (LT) no more than one year, and no less than 30 days, before opening date. LT Vent Brush vaccine must never be used.

Save vaccine box at home for your permanent record of brand and lot number.

Use vaccine for intranasal (in) or intracular (io) administration only.

Since all birds returned from the show are potential sources of infection to other birds, they should be isolated immediately after their return, separate and apart from all other birds. This isolation should be maintained indefinitely, if possible, or at least until it has been established that the birds are not carriers of disease-reproducing agents as may be determined by exposure of a few susceptible birds to direct contact with them.

c. Be sure to pick out a perfect specimen, then select the others as similar to it as possible. Never mix specimens of different maturity.

d. Protect from dirt, disease, infection, and mechanical damage.

Select specimens that are perfect and show no blemishes of any kind.

e. Condition and maturity. Be sure that exhibits are of high quality.

f. Potatoes should not be washed. Remove soil using a soft cloth or brush.

g. Tomatoes should have stems removed. Carrots, beets, etc. should have tops (leaves) removed from vegetables leaving about (2) two inches of stems.

3. Read premium material carefully following all rules and regulations. If an entry calls for five specimens, be sure to exhibit that number; do not enter four or six. In any instance, your exhibits will be disqualified if the correct number of specimens is not entered.
